34th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING THE WATERHOUSE CLUB INC

PRESIDENT'S REPORT Financial Year 2020/21 (prepared by Acting President, Tim Tolley)

Members of The Waterhouse Club, Committee Members, the South Australian Museum (the Museum) Director Brian Oldman. It is my pleasure to welcome you to this 34th AGM and the presentation of the President's Report 2020/21.

Following the retirement of our President, Ant Simpson, on the 16th February 2021, it has been my privilege to continue to preside over this most interesting and well-respected Museum Club. The Museum staff, Club members, support staff Natalie Rollinson and the Committee, in particular Margie Heylen as our Secretary, have all been instrumental in the Club resuming and continuing its fund-raising activities to benefit the Museum during the COVID-19 pandemic.

This has been the second year of Covid-19 for the Club and has been frustrating not knowing how COVID-19 would affect our activities. When the Museum closed its doors due to the lockdown in March 2020, we wanted to be on the front-foot when the doors re-opened on a then unknown date. Expedition Leaders and Event Co-ordinators, with the assistance of Professor Steve Donnellan, Head of Science, developed a varied and interesting program featuring some of the Museum's high-profile scientists. We presented the very successful "COMING OUT SERIES" of evening presentations by high profile Museum scientists which continued into 2021. Several postponed expeditions from 2020 were also able to be successfully re-scheduled in 2021.

The deterioration in our cash surplus in the previous year has shown signs of improvement through the hard work of our Committee. You, our members, have given us wonderful support through your attendance at both the "COMING OUT SERIES" and the re-introduction of some shorter expeditions.

The 2020/21 program has been varied and popular - our biggest problem has been oversubscribed expeditions. To balance this dilemma, some priority is proffered to new members or members who have not been on previous similar expeditions in the past, and we introduced a ballot system when expeditions were over-subscribed to allocate places fairly. We held waiting lists and made a commitment to plan a re-run of some expeditions in the future where possible, with booking priority to those who had missed out.

Our Activities 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021

Expeditions

Members would appreciate the vast amount of voluntary work that goes into planning and organising expeditions, and then the disappointment of cancelling. The effort of Expedition Leaders in sorting out the arrangements with participating scientists and contractors is appreciated. The expeditions which proceeded were as follows.

Collaboration with the Museum:

I was invited to a presentation by The Museum's Director, Mr Brian Oldman, of the "2021-2025 Strategic Plan: Re-imaging and Transforming the Museum for the 21st Century". Brian will speak to this Plan later this evening.

I also acknowledge and thank the Director for enabling the Club to have privileged access to the Museum's on-line programs. The Club Office distributed updates as they were received from the Museum - all well received by members.

The Museum's two support groups

- The Waterhouse Club, whose members are generally those entering their second age, with time to be intrigued by the science of the natural world, a taste for adventurous scientific expeditions, enjoy meeting like-minded people and working with scientists in the field.
- Secondly, the Museum Members support group, that caters primarily for families and young people and offers a diverse program largely offered from within the Museum's spaces.

The Waterhouse Club is the principal provider of access to the Museum's scientists with opportunities to mix with, and learn from them, on both local and far-ranging expeditions of discovery. Our web site - https://waterhouseclub.com - presents the current program and the benefits of membership and is seamless with that of the Museum and the Museum Members, with cross referrals to clarify the choices.

Administration and Governance - The Club Office

Our Club Secretary, Margie Heylen, administers the Club with great efficiency and the necessarily delicate touch from time to time. She provides reliable and magnificent support to the events and expedition program. Sadly, Margie is relinquishing her position at the 2022 AGM.

The Club's Administrative and Membership Liaison Officer, Natalie Rollinson, provides valuable administrative support in the Club office, assists with arrangements for our evening events and is on hand to meet and greet guests; organises the AGM and Committee meetings and records the minutes for which we thank her. Nat's cheerful character is a wonderful sounding board for all our members.

SA Museum Foundation (the Foundation)

All surplus funds raised by the Club are donated to the Foundation, being very welcome untied funds to the Museum for discretionary spending on Museum priorities. Clearly the impact of Covid-19 has severely restricted the Club's ability to generate a surplus comparable to recent years (refer to the Treasurer's Report).

As reported, in our second full Covid-19 financial year, we have been as active as Covid-19 restrictions have permitted, but some of our Club events have been limited in numbers and our traditional expeditions have been severely curtailed. In particular, our major fundraiser, overseas expeditions, have shuddered to a halt. Notwithstanding this we achieved an operating surplus for the year (prior to donations) of \$55,839.00. While this looks quite impressive in the circumstances, if you remove government Covid-19 subsidies, our net surplus for the financial year would have been a mere \$7,939.

The Club has continued to actively advocate for its members where expeditions have been cancelled, and we have obtained the maximum possible refunds for members.

Since the end of the 2020/21 financial year we have been in a position to donate \$50,000 to the Foundation, leaving us with a sufficient operating balance to comfortably continue. We are working towards a brighter future through an innovative program in 2021, 2022 and beyond. The 20% share of event and expedition surplus fund donated to the scientists this financial year totalled \$6,524.75, shown in Table 1. Donations from members totalling \$2,095.00 were also passed on to the Foundation. The total donation to the Museum/Foundation by the Club since inception stands at \$1,293,159.00

Expedition Leaders

All Expedition Leaders are to be thanked for their enthusiasm and willingness to take on the responsibility to carry out their vision within an approved budget. We have requests for repeat trips and have had waiting lists for all our expeditions - the reward received for organisational efforts. We will be repeating some of the popular expeditions of 2021 in 2022 and beyond. We are continually looking for future Expedition Leaders who will always have the support of the Committee and assistance from our numerous experienced Leaders and the Club office.

Our Expedition and Events Program The 2020/21 organizers who invested considerable time and wit to create expeditions and events are listed below. Particular mention is also made of the professional contributions of John Goldberg of Cowell Clarke. We also thank the guiding hand of Committee member Alastair Dow in assisting with draft communications and providing masterly and comprehensive documentation of the Club's policies and practices, both to guide new contributors and remind others of the secrets of our success. - The Club's cruise on the 32-passenger luxury cruise ship 'True North' from the "Sepik to Bougainville", has been transferred to "The Coral Atoll Expedition" in September 2023 with Ant Simpson, the Expedition Leader and Professor Steve Donnellan on board. It is heavily booked with only a few berths remaining.
- "Morocco and the Canary Islands" with Trevor & Carol Ireland as Expedition Leaders and the Museum's Associate Professor Diego Garcia-Bellido as the lead scientist. Planning is in progress.

In response to the very positive support for and feedback from the *COMING OUT SERIES*, I am pleased to announce the very popular events will continue in 2022. The show starter of wine and canapes is always popular, providing a welcome opportunity to socialise with Waterhouse Club friends and to make new acquaintances.

In conclusion

In my short term as Acting President I have focussed on promoting Anthropological experiences, such as the Nukunu experience with Dr Jared Thomas this year and in early 2022 an imaginative George French Angus expedition and an expedition to Raukkan near Meningie.

I would like to thank all the Committee Members, volunteers and Club members for their enthusiastic support of the Club and extend a thank you to all who have attended the AGM this evening.
