Repatriation of Ancestral Remains

The Museum Board cares for almost 5,000 ancestral remains, both Australian Aboriginal and from overseas nations. About 3,700 are from South Australian burial sites. A small number of ancestors are from interstate and there are another 400 Aboriginal ancestors whose original burial location is completely unknown. John Carty, Professor of Museum and Curatorial Studies at the University of Adelaide, and Head of Humanities at the South Australian Museum will lead the presentation.

Why are we getting so many pandemics?

Pandemics, the global spread of infectious diseases, seem to be making a comeback. In the Middle Ages we had the Black Death (plague), and after the First World War the Spanish flu (influenza). Tens of millions died. Then science began to get the upper hand, with vaccination eradicating smallpox from our planet, and polio nearly so. But then we had HIV/AIDS, and now COVID (no, it is not over yet!). Why is this happening?

Our President Professor Phil Weinstein will explore how our triple planetary crisis of climate change, biodiversity loss, and pollution helps to drive pandemics. He will discuss how healthy ecosystems keep people healthy through 'ecosystem services', and how the loss of these services can turn a localised outbreak into a pandemic. Fortunately, a new 'Planetary Health' approach being applied to research, teaching, and policy promises to reduce the risk of disastrous pandemics in the future.

Bees and Trees on Peramangk Country at Palmer

A full and interesting day with renowned ethnobiologist and native plant author Neville Bonney at his Kitticoola Dryland Arboretum near Palmer, where we will have the opportunity to tour rare Australian trees and wild food plants.

Permanent water and diversity of flowering plants make this property an attractive location for insects. Dr Remko Leijs and Dr Katja Hogendoorn, well-known native bee zoologists will also join us to explore the insect life of the area. Uncle Ivan-Tiwu Copley, descended from the Peramangk-Kaurna Peoples, will talk about the area's Aboriginal history. Morning tea and lunch will be provided and there will be some tastings too.

In the footsteps of George French Angas on the Fleurieu Peninsula.

An overnight expedition in the popular GF Angas series. Angas expert Dr Philip Jones will guide us through Angas's journey across the Fleurieu in 1844. We will try to identify George French Angas' painting sites used for his magnificent watercolours of the Fleurieu area that he visited, such as Yankalilla, The Bluff and the Murray Mouth. Discovering the wonderful world of nocturnal insects

This evening expedition to an outdoor venue in near Adelaide Hills with dynamic presenter Dr Ben Parslow (Museum's Collection Manager, Terrestrial Invertebrates) will feature the glorious richness of our nocturnal arachnids and insects. The evening will include a meal before the expedition.

Expedition. 13–16 Nov 2024

Bioluminescence and other mysteries of underground Tasmania

How do glowworms produce light, and what do they eat in apparently barren caves? How do thermal springs work, and do they produce healing waters? How do blind and colourless cave animals – troglobites – evolve? If you are keen to have first-hand experience of these phenomena, with evidence-based scientific explanations, this is the expedition for you.

Over three days at Hastings Caves, about 100km southwest of Hobart in the Huon Valley, we will wonder at glow worms, bask in a thermal pool, and explore cave habitats. Our President, Prof Phil Weinstein, has researched and published in all of these areas and will lead us through a balanced program of field trips and short seminars.

In addition, A/Prof Geoff Allen (who many members will remember from the 2023 Kangaroo Island Survey), will be showing us insect-plant interactions in the rainforest, and providing an engaging pre-dinner seminar.

The ground component will start at Hastings south west of Huonville, with expeditioners making their own way there.

EXPEDITIONS IN 2025

Nukunu, the people of the Southern Flinders Ranges

This is a repeat of a very popular expedition. It will be an introduction to the lands of the Nukunu people of the Southern Flinders Ranges. Dr Jared Thomas, Nukunu man, SAM anthropologist and scientist will interpret the history and culture of the Nukunu people. Based in Melrose, with ensuite cabin accommodation, there will be some walking on undulating pathways along creek beds and optional hill climbs interspersed with good food, wines and company. **Expedition Leaders:** David Cox and Jan Paterson

Expedition. 5-16 September 2025

Fire and Spice. Banda Sea – Ring of Fire and Spice Islands. Waiting list only

This intriguing expedition follows in the tradition of Club expeditions in the waters north of Australia, but will be aboard a traditional Indonesian vessel with local crew and thus more immersive, both culturally and environmentally. We will sail with SeaTrek, an Indonesian company with its head office in Bali, which has many years of experience in the islands of the Banda Sea, east and north of there.

Highlights of the voyage will include sailing through the area known as Wallacea, and learning more about the history and implications of Wallace's discoveries. We will also view several active volcanic islands, snorkel on healthy coral reefs, visit remote villages, and learn of the latest archaeological and anthropological research throwing more light on the history of human migration through the archipelago, as well as visiting the Banda Islands, the home of nutmeg. **Expedition Leader:** Mark Mussared

Expedition. Spring 2025 (date to be announced but will be scheduled to avoid a clash with Fire and Spice)

Exploring the amazing world of the Nullarbor Caves

The Nullarbor Caves are internationally famous places where you can find evidence of past and present biodiversity, including highly specialised insect species which are the particular interest of Dr Jess Marsh, the co-lead scientist of this expedition. We will also be accompanied by cave fossil expert Dr Liz Reed. Expeditioners will help the scientists document past and present biodiversity, record cave habitat features, and record threats, such as the presence of foxes.

Expeditoners will help collect and examine material, such as invertebrate specimens, bones and remains of vertebrates, and sediment samples. These specimens will allow the scientists to investigate recent historical changes to biodiversity, learn more about the climate when they occurred, and help predict future changes.

You won't need to abseil or don an aqualung for this expedition, but you will need a good level of fitness and agility. Whale-watching will also be an option. It will be a self-drive expedition with motel accommodation and catering.

Expedition. October – November 2025

Naracoorte Caves in Depth - A Weekend of Palaeontological Discovery in the World Heritage-listed Naracoorte Caves

A repeat of a very successful expedition, this expedition will give members access to key fossil sites and caves, and hands-on fossil sorting experience. Expeditioners will meet research scientists including Dr Liz Reed, Researcher and Senior Lecturer at Adelaide University who is a vertebrate palaeontologist specialising in Quaternary-aged cave deposits. The expedition will include a visit to the Bat Observation Centre Cave to observe the southern bent-wing bats which reside in Bat Cave and an opportunity to taste some local wines. **Expedition Leader:** Geoff Neumann
