EXPEDITIONS IN 2025

Several expeditions have been organised for this year and into the next. There should be something for everyone.

Expedition. 3-6 September 2025

Ediacaran fossils uncovered.

The Ediacaran fossil fields are a unique feature of the South Australian landscape, featuring exquisite fossils of the first multicellular life on earth, over 542million years ago. Every year a team of scientists and volunteers under the guidance of Associate Professor Diego Garcia-Bellido from the SA Museum and the University of Adelaide spends a week or two excavating new fossil beds. This year, Club members will have an exclusive opportunity to see such 'dig' in progress, with a two-day expedition to this region of the Flinders Ranges. Also included will be a visit to the renovated blacksmith shop to see the audio-visual display on a spectacular fossil bed, a tour of the existing fossil beds, a staged drive narrated by geologist Trevor Ireland through the aeons depicted in Brachina Gorge, and a visit to the old Blinman mine.

Expedition. 5-16 September 2025 Wait list only

Fire and Spice. Banda Sea – Ring of Fire and Spice Islands.

This intriguing expedition follows in the tradition of Club expeditions in the waters north of Australia but will be aboard a traditional Indonesian vessel with local crew and thus more immersive, both culturally and environmentally. We will sail with SeaTrek, an Indonesian company with its head office in Bali, which has many years of experience in the islands of the Banda Sea, east and north of there.

Highlights of the voyage will include sailing through the area known as Wallacea and learning more about the history and implications of Wallace's discoveries. We will also view several active volcanic islands, snorkel on healthy coral reefs, visit remote villages, and learn of the latest archaeological and anthropological research throwing more light on the history of human migration through the archipelago, as well as visiting the Banda Islands, the home of nutmeg.

Expedition. 17-24 October 2025

Exploring the amazing world of the Nullarbor Caves. Confirmed to proceed.

The Nullarbor Caves are internationally famous places where you can find evidence of past and present biodiversity, including highly specialised insect species which are the particular interest of Dr Jess Marsh, the co-lead scientist of this expedition. We will also be accompanied by cave fossil expert Dr Liz Reed. Expeditioners will help the scientists document past and present biodiversity, record cave habitat features, and record threats, such as the presence of foxes. In addition, there will be two expert cavers, Dr Steve Milner and Andrew Stempel, who will assist with cave access and expeditioner safety.

Expeditioners will help collect and examine material, such as invertebrate specimens, bones and remains of vertebrates, and sediment samples. These specimens will allow the scientists to investigate recent historical changes to biodiversity, learn more about the climate when they occurred, and help predict future changes.

You will not need to abseil or don an aqualung for this expedition, but you will need a good level of fitness and agility. It will be a self-drive expedition with motel accommodation and catering. The Expedition will start and finish at the Nullarbor Roadhouse west of Ceduna.

Expedition. 30-31 October 2025

In the footsteps of George French Angas on the Fleurieu Peninsula.

An overnight expedition in the popular GF Angas series. Angas expert Dr Philip Jones will guide us through Angas's journey across the Fleurieu in 1844. We will try to identify George French Angas' painting sites used for his magnificent watercolours of the Fleurieu area that he visited, such as Yankalilla, The Bluff and the Murray Mouth. The expedition will overnight in Victor Harbor.

Expedition. 14-17 November 2025

Naracoorte Caves in Depth - A Weekend of Palaeontological Discovery in the World Heritage-listed Naracoorte Caves.

A repeat of a very successful expedition, this expedition will give members access to key fossil sites and caves, and hands-on fossil sorting experience. Expeditioners will meet research scientists including Dr Liz Reed, Researcher and Senior Lecturer at Adelaide University who is a vertebrate palaeontologist specialising in Quaternary-aged cave deposits. The expedition will include a visit to the Bat Observation Centre Cave to observe the southern bent-wing bats which reside in Bat Cave and an opportunity to taste some local wines.

EXPEDITIONS IN 2026

Expedition. Early Spring 2026

Port Lincoln and Coffin Bay.

A proposed expedition with Dr Ben Parslow and Dr Philip Jones to search for an elusive forebear to the one and only Dinosaur Ant held in a jar at SAM that was recently recovered from the depths of the SAM collection.

The ant's parentage is apparently from the Coffin Bay Area where we hope to look for any of his family that has hidden from the scientists for many years. Philip Jones has some interesting stories on GF Angas' fourth journey to Port Lincoln in 1845 that we hope to delve into.

Expedition. 31 October - 07 November 2026

Lord Howe Island, World Heritage Area.

A week of fauna, flora and geology on this beautiful Island. Activities will be orchestrated by resident naturalist and conservationist [Ian Hutton](#) OAM. He has a 45-year relationship with the island and has been involved in the initiation of a number of conservation projects, including weed eradication, rodent eradication and studies of climate change. He is currently the Director of the LHI museum.

Activities will include walking to explore the plant and bird life, snorkelling or a glass bottomed boat experience and a boat trip. We have offered to be involved in any conservation activities that are current. There will also be some spare time just to enjoy the atmosphere and be involved in other activities such as golf, or very fit walkers may like to make private arrangements to walk up Mount Gower, which requires an accredited guide and will take a full day.

The expedition will start and end in Sydney. The flight from Sydney is early so expeditioners will need to arrange accommodation for the night of 30th October.
